Curriculum

The 2020 attendance rates are not available for publication as they were adversely affected by the COVID-19 pandemic and are not comparable to previous years.

Analysis

Our school is generally close to like schools data but predominately just under. Many parents tend to take students away during the winter months for summer holidays in the north of WA.

Highlights of 2020

There were many 2020 highlights for our school and community. These included:

- Students were provided with hand delivered work packs ready for a COVID 19 lockdown and communicated with their teachers through Zoom and SeeSaw. A highlight was the positive welcome that teachers were given when they delivered the work packs around the Cowaramup community.
 - A continued focus by staff and parents to make sure that students maintained a positive demeanour during the pandemic.
- Our students continued to enjoy their camps in Years 4-6. These have given students an opportunity to learn about teamwork, getting along with others whilst being presented with many physical challenges to conquer and build their self esteem.
- Say G'day to the Bay Day was run with the whole school at Cowaramup Bay for the 3rd year running. Students really enjoy the day and the environmental focus in the outdoor classroom.
- A makeover by parents was completed in the Kindergarten and Pre-Primary play areas.
- Our Year 6 students won the Schools Solar Challenge.
- The Australian flag now flies at the front of the school with the WA Flag and the Aboriginal flag for the first time.

Health and Physical Education

Successful Outcomes

- Students learnt and participated in a wide range of sporting activities.
- Specialist sports coaches gave our students access to a range of sporting opportunities.
- Opportunities for Interschool Sporting events were pursued.

Future Directions

• Continue to promote a diverse range of sports for students to learn.

The Arts

Successful Outcomes

- In 2020 we received a specialist art room and teacher. This has led to a greater complexity in students developing artistic and creative skills.
- All yr I-6 played drums, keyboards, untuned percussion and ukulele (3-6), individually and in groups.
- All P-6 played boom whackers and tuned bells, in groups.
- We experienced performances as both incursions and excursions.
- The school choir gave a magnificent performance at our end of year awards and the Year 6 graduation ceremony.

Future Directions

- Holding art exhibitions of student work in the future.
- Continue to develop the breadth of instruments played.
- Investigate the musical talents of our parent body and welcome them in to share their skills.

Mathematics

Successful Outcomes

- Origo Maths Program used across the school.
- Interrogation of ACER PAT maths tests linked to the WA curriculum to demonstrate continued progress.
- Use of question a day to whole class to focus on statistics and probability with data that demonstrates a significant improvement .

Future Directions

• Continue use of Origo Maths.

Science

Successful Outcomes

- Primary Connections is used as the basis for curriculum delivery.
- Science resources updated in kits to support teachers in practical activities.
- Nature Conservation group used across years 3-6 to assist in collecting data for local conservation projects.
- Students participating in environmental science activities at Say Gday to the Bay Day 2020.

Future Directions

- Continue to use Primary Connections planning documents to deliver the curriculum.
- Use ACER science testing to moderate teacher judgements in science.

HASS—Humanities and Social Sciences

Successful Outcomes

- A focus on the skills rather than the content at each year level. .
- Inclusion of Aboriginal knowledge and culture in HASS curriculum. .

Future Directions

- Updating of HASS resources.
- Continue to involve students in ANZAC ceremony at school and in Margaret River

English

Successful Outcomes

- Staff focusing on contemporary ways to ensure students read well.
- Upskilling of 3 reading champions to lead our 3 Professional Learning Teams.
- Development of an aged approach to reading and implement across the school.
- Letter Sounds continued across K-3.
- Words Their Way implemented to improve spelling results from Years 4-6.
- Some staff have been skilled in Talk for Writing
- Continue E-write testing using online ACER testing

Future Directions

Investigate evidence based approaches to teaching literacy eg; Talk for Writing and PLD- Promoting Literacy Development.

Languages Other than English

Successful Outcomes

Bahasa Indonesian is taught across Years 3-6.

Technology and Enterprise

Successful Outcomes

- ICT continues to be embedded across the school.
- Provision of digital technology resources for STEM activities. (Science, Technology, Engineering and Maths).
- An additional 50 IPads for students have been purchased for use across the school and some Chromebook. •
- Office 365 has been used as a tool for both staff and students. This continues to be used when students move from Cowaramup PS to Margaret River SHS.
- Seesaw was used with our school community across our school with great results.
- Zoom was used by staff to communicate with students when they were in lockdown at home.
