
Annual Report 2021

Cowaramup has a strong sense of community and a can-do approach to getting things done. We will continue to foster this connection with the community to value add to our programs.



Analysis

The attendance of students was just above the percentage of similar schools and all WA Public schools. This is a continuing trend over the years. The impact of parents taking students away on holidays during the school term particularly during the winter months has a big impact on our school attendance.

Highlights of 2021

There were many highlights for our school and community in 2021. These included:

- Our Year 4 students were involved in the "Adopt a Spot" program learning and caring for the coastal environment at Cowaramup Bay and the Year 6's conducting environmental studies at Duggan Dam and nearby rural properties.
- Say "Gday to the Bay Day," involved our whole school from Kindergarten to Year 6 at Cowaramup Bay where students were involved in environmental activities and learning about indigenous knowledge of the local area. This was the 4th year this event has been run with parents and the school joining together with local providers to organise this outstanding opportunity for the students of Cowaramup.
- Students enjoyed participating in the Readers and Writers Festival with authors and illustrators coming to school to share their knowledge and passion for books.
- Our school ANZAC service run by our Student Council.
- Interschool Netball, soccer. hockey and the Red Ball tennis competition.
- The before school running club in Term 4, as students prepared for an Interschool Cross Country race in Margaret River.
- The school Book Week parade had many students dressing up as their favourite book character and celebrating their love of reading.
- The Super Science Circus Show entertained and showed students the magic of science.
- The Year 4 adventure days around Cape Leeuwin.
- The Year 5 camp to Perth.
- The Year 6 team building camp to Manjedal in Jarrahdale.
- The large variety of sporting coaches that came and worked with students to teach and show them a wide variety of sports.












Curriculum Academic Excellence NAPLAN 2021



Our year 3 and 5 students met their target of being at like school average in writing. Our students in Years 3 and 5 did not meet our target in spelling.


Recommendations Response

Analysis

This year was the first year that we have implemented the Promoting Literacy Development program in the early years. The program scaffolds learning each year and it has been pleasing to see the students in Pre-Primary and Year 1 meet the targets. Our Year 2 and Year 3 students did not all meet the target. As the Promoting Literacy Development Program is implemented further in 2022 we would expect this result to improve and for the students to catch up.


Recommendations Response


Continue to teach the Promoting Literacy Development program with fidelity and look at expanding this program into Year 4 –6. This will further embed the skills and support all students academic levels.



Students from Years 1—6 have continued to be above the national average in Maths in their ACER tests.







In years 2 –6 students are above the national average in Reading. The Year 1 students were below the national average.









Continue the high number of positives to negatives as a way of reinforcing positive behaviour. Research tells us that when this is happening, negative behaviours remain low.




National School Opinion Survey - A positive ranking of 4 or above. (scale of 1-5)
