


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Welcome

Highlights of 2022


The highlights of 2022 included:

- Participation in many different sports with specialist coaches during their PE lessons.
- Our students joining with other students and schools as a large choir here in Cowaramup.
- Excursions to Discover Deadly, the Eagles Heritage Park and Lawn Bowls at the Cowaramup Club.
- A day where the whole school were immersed in STEM learning using our new Lego STEM kits.
- Say Gday to the Bay continued with great support from environmental providers and the school community.




Our attendance was slightly below like schools. Attendance was overall down and this was due to the pandemic and the increased number of students who were away unwell.



Students from Years 1,2,4,5 & 6 have continued to be above the national average in Maths in their ACER tests and have met our target. Our Year 3 students were just below the national average.





Years 2,4, 5 & 6 were above the national average and have met the targets set. Years 1 and Year 3 were just below the national average.










Recommendations Response

Testing later in the year using the ACER testing was closer to the national average than our NAPLAN results.



NAPLAN testing at this time was during the pandemic with high absences of students.



The 3 stages outlined in our targets are tested regularly and inform the placement of students in groups. It is recommended that we use a different measurement tool using an age based normed test in 2023.


Culture

There was an extremely high number of positives given out compared to negative referrals. The result shows that staff are reinforcing positive behaviour frequently. This target has easily been met.


